Personhood is for people: Corporations, Democracy, and Our Sustainable Future

The Supreme Court granted corporations the status of legal person in 1886 enabling them to claim individual rights and protections guaranteed to persons in the Constitution and Bill of Rights. While human beings have had to struggle to have to keep these rights, corporations have used their power to dominate governing decisions about society, politics, economics and culture. This workshop provides a history of this domination and contrasts it with social movements and peoples' struggles. 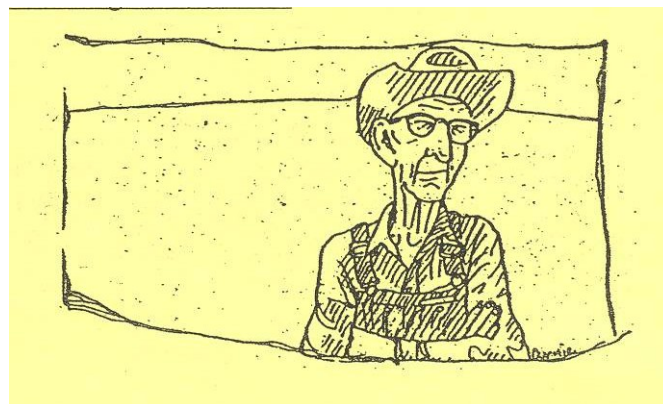
