In the meantime.... While sorting it out or choosing a life boat...



#### REINA DEL CID Saturday, Feb. 20<sup>th</sup>, 8PM

Sizzling folk

Faced with the question of influences, Reina del Cid cites literary rather than musical heroes. The songwriter commands a flexibility of language reminiscent less of Regina Spektor or Ingrid Michaelson, artists she is often compared to, but more of Virginia Woolf or Sylvia Plath. Yet there is a Newtonian balance of forces in Reina del Cid's band: for every droll phrase or inventive image, there is a corresponding musical contribution from the richly talented Toni Lindgren. The young guitarist is adept at orchestrating and fleshing out the skeletons of del Cid's songs into an engaging brand of pop rock. These lyrical and musical forces have never combined more compellingly than in the band's sophomore album, The Cooling. Recorded at the historic Pachyderm Studio in Cannon Falls, the new album is marked by "sizzling folk wisdom" (Maximum Ink), and "a chilling, string-kissed ode to the slipping from life to death . . . a delicious collection of songs"(Playback:stl).

Traditional and original folk

With "a sense of timing to match the best stand-up comic," Bill Staines' music is a slice of Americana, reflecting with the same ease on the prairie people of the Midwest and the adventures of the Yukon. Between original songs, Bill includes traditional folk tunes and more contemporary country ballads. Bill delights in having the audience participate in many numbers and never fails to please. His show is always a great way to spend a Sunday afternoon.

#### **CURTIS AND LORETTA** Sunday, Mar. 5<sup>th</sup>, 8PM Traditional and original folk

Curtis & Loretta's music comes straight from the heart. The husband and wife duo's extraordinary harmonies and proficiency on a parade of stringed instruments create an alluring frame for their poignant original songs, and traditional pieces from America and the British Isles. he current menagerie includes mandocello, folk harp, guitars, clawhammer banjo, ukulele, and mandolin, plus a bit of kazoo, harmonica, and shakers. Curtis' down-home sense of humor and Loretta's theater background engage the audience in an experience that runs the gamut of rolling with laughter to holding back tears, with plenty of side-trips in between. Their new CD "When There's Good to Be Done" features original songs crafted with Loretta's poignant story-telling style, and presented with Curtis & Loretta's signature tight harmonies and array of stringed instruments.

#### CHRIS SILVER & THE GOOD INTENTIONS Saturday, Mar. 12th 8PM

Bluegrass with global rhythms and contemporary themes Led by Chris Silver. The Good Intentions deliver traditional bluegrass with polish and drive. The band plays songs from the bluegrass masters as well as material penned by Silver. Soulful original arrangements of their songs have already established the band in the hearts of the Midwest bluegrass community. Their success is based on the complimentary picking and singing skills of some of the best known names in the area's bluegrass scene. Silver plays fiddle and mandolin with a deep appreciation for traditional bluegrass music, but it doesn't stop there. His solos stretch beyond the boundaries of bluegrass including hints of jazz, blues, and roots music. The quartet is rounded out with Banjo player Heath Loy, flatpicking guitarist Mike Cramer and J D. Shaffer holding down the bass role with precision and tone. ## Electric Irish, Rock'n'reel & Punk folk

Since 1983, BiL have been innovators in bridging traditional music from many cultures with the sound and attitude of a rock band. A Boiled In Lead concert is a combination of darkly-tinged folk ballads and originals alongside instrumental dance music from Ireland and elsewhere. The group and the individual musicians have won many Minnesota Music Awards, and toured throughout the US and in Europe. For 2016, core members Todd Menton, David Stenshoel and Drew Miller move forward as a quartet, adding drummer and multi-ethnic percussionist Michael Bissonette to the lineup. Michael has a wide musical vocabulary, and is heard around the Twin Cities with Katie McMahon, Laura MacKenzie, and Robert Everest (among others.) Enthusiastic, powerful, technically brilliant, playing a wealth of instruments with extreme dynamics, Boiled In Lead routinely demolishes genres with its highlyidentifiable sound....even without amplification, Boiled In Lead can summon up furious punk-folk energy."
